### The Holy Family

"Behold, I and the children whom the Lord has given me are signs and portents of Israel from the Lord of hosts" Isaiah 8: 18.

Home life for believers is so vitally important because it ought to reflect the values God's revelation over the centuries has taught us. Unquestionably, parents have as their primary objective conforming the will of their children to the mind of the Creator.

Consequently, we must teach our children how to forgive, how to make our homes places of love and forgiveness. We must make our streets and neighborhoods centers of peace and reconciliation. Sadly, with alarming apprehension we observe that in so many families, Christian values are not being taught or lived. We are thoroughly satisfied with the massive approach of secular humanism overwhelming us without teaching the truth of the Lord as an antidote. We try to do what is upright, respected and accepted as behavior standards in our society. We forget all that we profess must be based on the singular values of our Saviour. We cannot achieve success in our society without living the kind of life that ends in salvation. We may be appealing and attractive to our non-believing neighbors on the basis of their standards, but that does not mean we are appealing in the sight of our God. We may promote college degrees for our children, thereby showing how much we appreciate the values of a secular world and how it looks at successful parenting, but we do not get even equally excited these very same children do not even have an idea of Christian life except as it coincides with the values of a fallen world.

It is not without reason that Jesus Christ, the Son of God spent thirty years of his life hidden at home. He wanted to point out in this way that the home has a power, a fundamental influence on man. The family is the historic and visible expression of the love of God among us.

The reward or promise of eternal life with him should always console and encourage us even in dark and difficult moments along the path of life's journey. We should strive each day to deepen our union with Christ by putting aside time for prayer and reflection and being mindful of his ever-loving abiding presence within us. In a hectic life sometimes this can be difficult but there has to be some quiet spot or special time when we can be with him alone and not caught up in the cares of the moment which quickly passes.

By daily growing in his love, we can by our example influence others as we radiate his message of love, joy and peace with all we are in daily contact with.

Lord Jesus Christ, Almighty Son of the Father, I pray that daily I may deepen my love and union with you so that one day I maybe with you for all eternity. Amen.

But we know we are actually older than that by nine months. The Psalmist expressed it in poetic language, "You created my innermost being; You knit me together in my mother's womb" Psalms 139: 13. The Psalmist praises God for knowing everything about him. He writes about the wonderful ways he was created and brought into being. When there were as yet no days in his life, all his days were known only to God. Thinking about that prompted him to praise, he says "How precious to me are your thoughts, O God" Psalms 139: 17. Without thinking, we often congratulate each other when we reach another year, as if to say, "Good, you made it." But we ought to thank God and give Him the gratitude for each passing year. By the grace of the Holy Spirit, we live and we have our being. How important it is to have a personal, intimate relationship with our heavenly Father! Do you really know this merciful Father, this loving God Who makes your birthdays possible?

# Expect To Be Beautiful

Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand Isaiah 64: 8.

Dear heavenly Father; Divine Potter, the lump of clay that I am keeps crying for definitive form day by day. I yearn for molding, to be perfected in your image and life. Lord this a song of trust. I am in your hands like clay and I wish you to know I expect to be molded. Grant me the strength to become the form you expect of me. Use me for your glory. I expect to be beautiful in your sight. I do expect to be loved because I trust in your promises. Make me usable for the cause of man's salvation. And if by chance someone should drop me as your apprentices sometimes do, I expect to be hurt, even broken. I am just trying to say I am confident O Lord because I am in your hands just like clay. Lord grant me the necessary grace to strengthen the truth about myself no matter how beautiful it is! Amen.

In a recent obituary notice which seems to be the standard today over the internet, an announcement was made about the death of a son of a clergyman. It so happens that for whatever reason this person never attended church in his adult married life, did not rear his children as believers and was successful, as the world judges it, in his education and in his employment experience. All the greetings of his friends, co-workers and neighbors agreed he was a very happy and responsible employee and friend. There was a purposeful attempt to emphasize his religious background, featuring several photos of his father readily recognizable as a clergyman.

He was not buried from the church and there were no religious ceremonies attendant to his interment. Somewhere along the line he lost contact with God and lived the good life as he himself interpreted it to be. Apparently, also, there was never any significant attempt over the years to return him to the path of Christ, unless these too, encountered failure. In the fullness of his earthly activity, there apparently was never time for prayer in Christ, no time to nurture and respond to the needs of the soul, but certainly more than appropriate time for feeding the allusions of earthly success. Now that he is out of the boundaries of this limited world, we are saddened to think of his encounter with the reality of a living and just God and why he felt it so necessary to embarrass the vocation of his father's entire life, castigate Christ and provide a loser's example to his children. What happened between the years of his early family life when he chose to pursue secular humanism and the still remaining descriptions of him as a fine and upright human being in his family and professional life in which there was a glaring absence of the source of joy and salvation and hope in Christ? What brought him to the conclusion he could go it alone and finally repudiate Christ and his Body, the Church by choosing cremation as a final solution for seeming obliteration from the sight of God and accountability before his throne?

The value of baptismal grace was apparently not appealed to and he placed himself outside the ability of our Lord to save him. Perhaps the interested intercessory prayers of believers will touch the grown-cold hearts of his offspring and remaining family members and provide the kind of exemplary Christian living example which will draw them back to the salutary grace and embrace of our Saviour before they too are lost for all eternity.

Dear Lord, heavenly Father, amiable Holy Spirit, help me increase the love of God in my family before it is too late!

#### Jesus Loves Me

And the word became flesh and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth John 1: 14.


### The Holy Innocents

Call upon me in the day of trouble Psalms 50: 15.

Apparently to annihilate any possibility of a new-born king among his subjects, Herod determines to annihilate all who could potentially claim his throne. He thinks nothing in his pagan inhuman mind-set to dispatching his minions into the kingdom to relieve of life all those two years and under so superficially imagined peace may thrive in the desert kingdom.

Each year, following the feast of the Nativity of our Lord, the Church recalls the memory of the Holy Innocents of Bethlehem put to death by order of the local Roman king so that a Messiah-Saviour-King might be numbered among them and his throne safely secured for a while longer. These first martyrs for the sake of our Infant Prince of Peace are remembered with gratitude as salvation enters the world. Their physical lives are extinguished, but their souls lighten our way by the brightness and encouraging innocent light in these dark times.

- When God's will as on this fest day seems difficult and incomprehensible to us, have mercy on us.
- When sorrow and sadness, disgust and anguish overshadow us as they did you, have mercy on us.
- When the holiness and justice of God fills us with terror, have mercy onus.
- When we are left without help and assistance as you were, have mercy on us.
- When our loves receives only ingratitude in return, have mercy on us.
- When we think the Father does not seem to hear our prayers, have mercy on us.
- When the light of faith seems to be diminishing during our night of suffering, have mercy onus.
- When nothing else lives on in us except our final misery, our complete powerlessness and the incomprehensibility of God, have mercy on us.



#### THE "ART" OF WRITING ICONS

he Orthodox Church has long been known for expressing her theology through iconography. Indeed, our precious Faith is visually brought to life with the sacred images that adorn our churches and our homes. By definition, icons are "two-dimensional images of Christ, the Theotokos, the Saints, important Biblical events or significant events in Church History." St. Gregory the Dialogist refers to icons as being "scriptures to the illiterate," making the point that one can simply look at an icon and learn lessons that may take volumes to express in words. Icons are meant to lift up our thoughts to heavenly things or, as St. John of Damascus writes: "We are led by icons to the contemplation of that which is divine and spiritual."

The Evangelist Luke is said to have been the first iconographer. He "WROTE" the icon of the Theotokos (icons are written, not painted) known as the Directress, or "The one who points the way." Since then, true iconographers have dedicated their lives to expressing the dogmas and teachings of the Church through their works. To be an iconographer, one truly must experience a calling from the Lord. An iconographer must pray and fast prior to beginning their work. Writing an icon is said to be, in itself, a form of prayer. Iconographers have maintained that each stroke of their brush is a meditation, which constantly reminds them of the necessity of inner peace as they proceed with their work. An iconographer never "SIGNS" an icon, for it is not really his or her work, but merely a depiction of what has been revealed to them through the grace of the Holy Spirit. May we pray that the Church will continue to be blessed with men and women dedicated to preserving this wonderful aspect of our Holy Orthodox Faith.

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
