We are a beacon on a hill with the eyes of many upon us; that beacon is the inspired Light of Christ which must shine brightly in our lives.



Being Obedient To God

Would that they might always be of such a mind, to fear me and to keep all my commandments! Then they and their descendants would prosper forever Deuteronomy 5: 29.

If you fear the Lord and worship him, if you are obedient to him and do not rebel against the Lord's command, if both you and the king who rules you follow the Lord your God, well and good 1 Samuel 12: 14.

None of those who cry out, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of God but only the one who does the will of my Father in heaven. Matthew 7: 21.

Observe my precepts and be careful to keep my regulations, for then you will dwell securely in the land. The land will yield its fruit and you will have food in abundance, so that you may live there without worry Leviticus 25: 18, 19.

There is, on the other hand, the man who peers into freedom's ideal law and abides by it. He is no forgetful listener, but one who carries out the law in practice. Blessed will this man be in whatever he does James 1: 25.

He who keeps the precept keeps his life, but the despiser of the word will die Proverbs 19: 16.

Therefore, if you listen to my voice and keep my covenant, you shall be my special possession, dearer to me than all other people, though all the earth is mine Exodus 19: 5.

Happy are they whose way is blameless, who walk in the law of the Lord. Happy are they who observe the decrees, who seek him with all their heart Psalms 119: 1, 2.

If you are willing and obey, you shall eat the good things of the land Isaiah 1: 19.

Once you know all these things, blessed will you be if you put them into practice John 13: 17.

LOVE OR INFATUATION???

Infatuation literally leaps into bloom. Love usually takes root slowly and grows one day at a time. It is slower and takes much longer because it must come to know the other person before it can love them. Infatuation is accompanied by a sense of uncertainty. Infatuation stimulates and thrills you, but you are not really happy or fulfilled. You are miserable when he is absent. You cannot wait until you see him again. Infatuation depends on the excitement of your emotions which change and are fleeting. Love is stable and depends on the act of your unchanging will to commit to another human being.

Love begins with a feeling of security. You are approaching and bonding with an equal. You are warm with a sense of his nearness, even when he is away. Miles do not separate you. You want him near. But near or far, he is committed to you and you can wait.

Infatuation says, "We must get married right away. I can't risk losing him." Love says, "Don't rush into anything. You are certain of one another. You can plan your future in leisure with confidence."

Infatuation has an element of sexual excitement. If you're honest, you will discover it is difficult to enjoy one another unless you know it will end in intimacy. Infatuation mistakes and confuses lust with love. Love is the maturation of friendship and mutual respect. You must be friends before you marry and become lovers.

Infatuation lacks confidence. When he's away, you wonder if he's with another girl. Sometimes you even check on him. Love means trust. You may fall into infatuation, but you never fall in love, you enter its blessings with both eyes open and freedom of will. Infatuation might lead you to do things for which you will be sorry, but genuine love never will. After all, our love for each other in marriage is a duplication of God's heavenly love for us! God uses us to express His love for our beloved.

Love elevates and lifts up. It makes you think affirmatively. It makes you a better person than you were before, than you were alone, than you were without the blessing of God's grace and a loving life partner!

Choose, then, enduring God-based love, not passing infatuation or self-destroying lust.

GOOD NEWS FOR PEOPLE ON THE GO...

All men complain they don't have enough time. They look at their lives from far too human a perspective. There is always time to do what God want us to do. After all, God created us for heaven. How can it be we don't have time for heaven here and now? We must put ourselves completely into each moment God offers us. If heaven is truly our eternal destiny, we must live it here and now.

"I went out, Lord, and men were coming and going, walking and running.

Everything was rushing: cars, trucks, the entire street, the whole town was afire with activity. Men were rushing not to waste time. They were rushing after time, to catch up with time, to gain time, to make up for time, to pursue time.

Good-bye Sir, excuse me, I haven't time. I'll come back. I can't wait. I haven't time. I'd love to help you, but I don't have time. I can't accept, having no time. I can't think. I can't read. I can't grow as God expects of me. I'm swamped. I haven't time. I'd like to pray, but I haven't time. My life is so filled I can't worship God. I don't have time

You understand, Lord, they simply don't have time. Life makes so many demands. The child is playing; he doesn't have time to pray or worship You, Lord. Later on... the school boy has his homework to do; he hasn't time. Later on, the student has his courses, and so much work, he can't come to church now. Later on the grandparents have their grandchildren... they haven't time to bring them to church; they are preoccupied, there is no time."

And so all men run after time, foolishly thinking they can live empty lives without God while pursuing their own nightmares, not dreams. In spite of all their efforts they still are short of time. God had enough time to create the world an all that is in it, but man doesn't have enough time to do his job, worship God and save his soul. Lord, you must have made a mistake in Your calculations! There is a big mistake somewhere. The hours are too short, the days are not long enough, our lives overlap.

We forget, dear Lord, time is the gift You gave us to save our souls. Time is the period in which we are to sustain ourselves on this earth and make ourselves worthy of paradise. Why is it, Lord, we have time for everything else, but we don't have time for You? Why can't we do what You asked us to do? Why can't we keep Sunday as Your day, O Lord? Time is a gift that You gave us, but time is perishable. We cannot spend time, it must be invested. If we don't invest it in eternity, we will literally run out of time.

Lord, I truly have time. All the time that You give me, I dedicate to You, the years of my life, the days of my years, the hours and minutes of my days. They are all mine, so they are all Yours. Mine to fulfill completely, Yours to sanctify and elevate and use in drawing me into Your eternal kingdom. May I always have enough time to dedicate to You, to offer to You, with which to worship You!

Why not keep a record journal for one week of how you spend your time and see where it goes?

What are your priorities? What are your necessities?

How much time does Christ get? Is He simply an option or a diversion?

How much time do you give to the Church? How much time do you offer to God in prayer and worship?

How much time to you spend in an attempt to keep yourself healthy by doctor's visits and appointments?

Compare that with how much time you invest in seeking help from the Divine Physician in the sacramental Mystery of Anointing with Oil and Reconciliation, or the confession of sins?

Time lost to God is usually ends up being spent with a doctor. But a doctor cannot save the soul even if he had all the time in the world! We must be very careful in our rush through life, we don't simply run past heaven!


What Is A Parish?

"What I have to say here may come as a shock to the great majority of Orthodox in America. Yet it is a self-evident fact that the parish as we have come to know it now, i.e., as an organization with lay officers, by-laws, finances, property, meetings, elections, etc., is a very recent phenomenon and exists in fact, only exclusively within the "disapora." Parishes in traditional Orthodox countries do not operate nor are they established in the way we observe here in America. What we take as normative and natural form of the Church's existence is not at all so clearly visible in the tradition of the Church and what we witness here is not at all normative. The "parish" as we know it today, is, in spite of its religious connotations, and this may come as a second shock, is a product of secularization, or rather, that in the process of its development within the American way of life, has accepted a secularistic basis which little by little dissolves the ultimate seriousness of that which it claims to serve, and to be, the Church of Christ. Many Orthodox parishes mislead the general public because they in reality have nothing in fact to do with Christ or salvation. To understand this one must briefly analyze the genesis and the development of the Orthodox parish in America."

"The first thing Orthodox immigrants did as they settled in America was to build churches. The church was a self-evident, organized part of their life in the old country. It became their first need in the new world. It was a need for the church, for genuine worship, for the sacramental Mysteries, for the possibility to baptize, to marry and bury, not for a "parish" as understood so many times today, but rather for a parish in the old traditional sense of the word, a place where one could authentically worship together with others and have a religious and spiritual term of reference for all of life. It is what secularists in our midst were permitted to do with our parishes since then that has aroused the notice of religious people. Every evil screams only one message; "I am good." This is what we have heard far to long to believe it and far too long not to do something positive about addressing the true purpose of the parish in the Orthodox Church. God Himself stands before us in our parishes, not in greatness and glory, for then we would submit ourselves to Him as cowardly slaves. He stands instead, before us in a crown of thorns and a purple robe, suffering as realistically as He did then. It is only in relation to Him that we are free, as Pilate was free, and in this freedom each of us determines his own eternal destiny, following Him or secularism." Does God ever think,

"But I gave it to them to enjoy?"



Did you ever wonder what God must think? How it must sadden Him, Who has given us everything we have, when He sees us get anxious, upset, and plagued with ulcers over what He intended for us to enjoy? To better understand, let us cast this question in terms of our own children. We give them toys for their birthday, games at Christmas, maybe a Cabbage Patch Doll here and a set of building blocks there. Very soon they have a whole playroom full of things to enjoy. And that pleases us very much, because that is why we gave them to them in the first place -- TO ENJOY!! They are gifts of our grace, given because we love them. We get deep satisfaction watching them enjoy our gifts.

Then, lo and behold, one day we peek into the playroom, and there is little Billy, sitting on the floor, completely taken up with his building blocks. He is surrounded by other things, waiting for him to enjoy when he wants them. But, for the moment, they go unnoticed, because he can only enjoy one thing at a time. Right now, though, his world is all building blocks, and he is happy. Then his little sister slips in the door unnoticed, and casually kneels down by the fire truck with a real hook and ladder. In just mo-

ments, she is taken up with that, thoroughly enjoying herself and the toy. Suddenly Billy catches a glance at sis out of the corner of his eye. Just as suddenly, his face tightens up and turns red. With a stern and determined look, he springs to his feet and makes a lunge for sis's fire truck. From four rooms away you hear Billy's voice, distorted by screams and cries and shouts, all underline with a loud, ugly, "THAT'S MINE!!!"

You rush to the playroom, and Billy is no longer happy. Neither are you! What you gave him to enjoy has turned into a source of distress for both of you. You scold him for being selfish, and it dawns on you that you are now grieving grieving because what you gave him to enjoy has brought out the very worst in him. Your gift of grace has turned into a cause for much unhappiness. You are sorry you ever gave them, and you are tempted to take them all back. After all, what was intended to be a blessing has soured into a curse of sorts.

Does God, the Giver of all, ever look down on the 'playrooms' and the 'toyboxes' of our lives which He has filled so graciously because He loves us - and grieve over His generosity? You see, He has filled our lives with good things, things from the bounty of His hand. They were for us to enjoy. They were also for us to share. Even when we share a generous portion of them. we still have more than we can use. The Bible calls this "proportionate giving." It is the reality that all we have comes from God, and as stewards of these gifts, God asks us to return and to share a portion of them - just a small portion. WHAT MUST GOD THINK WHEN HE SEES US CLUTCH THEM AND HOLD THEM TIGHT? WHAT MUST HE THINK WHEN WHAT HE GAVE US TO ENJOY BRINGS OUT THE VERY WORST IN US? WHEN IT TURNS INTO A SOURCE OF ANX-IETY AND FRUSTRATION?

Does God ever think, "But I gave it to them to enjoy?" It's just a thought a stewardship thought!!

THE ROLE OF ANGELS IN GOD'S CREATION

he Nicene Creed proclaims that God is the "Creator of Heaven and earth, and of all things. visible and invisible." Just who are these invisible entities created by our Heavenly Father? They are angels. According to the Scriptures and Holy Tradition, the Orthodox Church has provided us with the names of seven leaders of the heavenly powers. Perhaps the best known is the Archangel Michael. Michael in Hebrew means "Who is equal to God?" Of course, no one is like God that is why he captained the army that drove Lucifer from heaven, for in his pride, Lucifer believed himself to be God's equal. Gabriel ("power of God") is known for being God's chosen messenger. He is best remembered for announcing to the Virgin Mary that she was to give birth to Christ. Raphael means "God's healing." For this reason, he is often depicted holding a physician's

iar in his hand. The fourth angel with which we are familiar is Uriel - "light of God." We usually see Uriel holding a sword in his right hand and a burning branding iron in his left. Angel #5 -Iegudiel - literally means "one who glorifies God." We often find legudiel bearing a golden wreath in one hand and a whip in the other. Barachiel, another of the angels known by name, is commonly found wearing a white rose on his breast. His name is translated as "the blessing of God." Finally, we find the angel Salathiel - "one who prays with God." Fittingly enough, Salathiel is depicted in a posture of prayer, with hands folded and head bowed. What purpose do angels serve? Thev constantly minister at God's Holy Throne. They are God's messengers, who serve Him in whatever way He desires. Finally, they fill the important role as our protectors and guardians.
