"Let's get rid of him and say that he was killed by a lion," said another brother.




"No!" said Reuben, the oldest brother. "Do not kill him. We will put him in the well out here in the wilderness."




When Joseph arrived, his brothers took his beautiful coat.






Then they took him and threw him into a dry well.

The Pharaoh's butler, and the Pharaoh's baker who had also been imprisoned each told Joseph of their troubling dreams.




Joseph told the butler what his dream meant. He said, "Within three days Pharaoh will take you out of prison and give you your job back."
