An angel talks to Gideon.


Judges 6:1-24



ELIAS THE PROPHET

When Elijah carried the boy down to his mother, she said, "I know you're a man of God. You speak God's words and they are true."




Three years passed without any rain, just as Elijah had said. God sent Elijah to see King Ahab.

Elijah taunted them. "Shout louder. Maybe your fake god is taking a nap."


The prophets of Baal kept it up until evening, but no fire came.

The people chased and killed the prophets of Baal. Queen Jezebel was furious! She was determined to kill Elijah. Exhausted and scared, Elijah ran away.


God sent an angel to Elijah with food and water. Then he traveled forty days and nights to Mount Horeb. He climbed into a cave and spent the night there.
